Science

Lifecycles

Following on from last week looking at butterfly life cycles, this week we will look at the lifecycle of another animal, a spider. Look at the PowerPoint to find out about the spider's lifecycle. Download the worksheets if you are in Reception or Y1 – p1 is for Reception and p2 for Y1. Reception children can just stick the pictures in the right order. Y1 can add labels to the pictures. Y2 children – can you draw your own lifecycle for a spider? Add some labels and some interesting facts. Don't forget to include a title and use arrows between your pictures. If you prefer to make your lifecycle using art supplies then that is fine too. If you want to try a harder challenge then look at the work for the year above. If you want to push yourself even further then look up some facts about spiders. National geographic kids is always a good place to start.
